

Source: American Community Survey (ACS) is an ongoing statistical survey conducted by the US Census Bureau. It regularly gathers information previously contained only in the long form of the decennial census, thus filling a vital data gap.

Note: Family: A family consists of a householder and one or more other persons living in the same household who are related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption. All persons in a household who are related to the householder are regarded as members of his or her family. A household can contain only one family for purposes of census tabulations. Not all households contain families since a household may comprise a group of unrelated persons or one person living alone.



Source: American Community Survey (ACS) is an ongoing statistical survey conducted by the US Census Bureau. It regularly gathers information previously contained only in the long form of the decennial census, thus filling a vital data gap.

Note: Owner Occupied Housing Unit: A housing unit is owner occupied if the owner or co-owner lives in the unit even if it is mortgaged or not fully paid for.

Renter Occupied Housing Unit: All occupied housing units which are not owner occupied, whether they are rented for cash rent or occupied without payment of cash rent, are classified as renter occupied.

OHA Demography: To compile "basic demographic data on native Hawaiians and Hawaiians" and identify "the physical, sociological, psychological, and economic needs of native Hawaiians and Hawaiians." Hawaii Revised Statute, Chapter 10



Source: American Community Survey (ACS) is an ongoing statistical survey conducted by the US Census Bureau. It regularly gathers information previously contained only in the long form of the decennial census, thus filling a vital data gap.

Note: Family Income: In compiling statistics on family income, the incomes of all members 15 years old and over in each family are summed and treated as a single amount.

Household Income: Includes the income of the householder and all other persons 15 years old and over in the household, whether related to the householder or not. Because many households consist of only one person, average household income is usually less than average family income.

Per Capita Income: Per capita income is the mean income computed for every man, women, and child in a particular group.



Source: American Community Survey (ACS) is an ongoing statistical survey conducted by the US Census Bureau. It regularly gathers information previously contained only in the long form of the decennial census, thus filling a vital data gap.

Note: Unemployed: All civilians 16 years and over are classified as unemployed if they were (1) neither "at work" nor "with a job but not at work" during the reference week, (2) looking for work during the last 4 weeks, and (3) available to accept a job. Also included as unemployed are civilians who did not work at all during the reference week and were waiting to be called back to a job from which they had been laid off.
