• Single and now married people comprised 40% and 46% of the Native Hawaiian population, respectively. The divorce rate of Native Hawaiians is higher than the state rate. The divorce rate may contribute to the high number of Native Hawaiian female householders with children (a family with a female householder), and possibly to the high number of Native Hawaiian Mother-Child subfamilies (mother and child family living in a household and related to the householder).
